#### **GIFTED AND TALENTED AT FAITH**

What does the term 'Gifted and Talented' mean? It is often considered that the students in this area are a homogenous population themselves; however, gifts and talents correspond to distinct types of abilities. These natural abilities can be divided into four aptitude domains of either, intellectual, creative, social or physical. Everyone possesses some form of ability in each domain but it is those whose ability level largely exceeds most of their peers that are considered "gifted". With this in mind, gifted and talented students are encouraged to stay with their peer groups to allow them to develop their other domains effectively. At Faith, students are catered for within the classroom with multi-level activities and programs developed for pupils in order to develop and improve their skills, whilst enhancing their inherent motivation to learn. By stimulating their interests and creating a climate that promotes achievement, students are encouraged to accept and value their gifts.

Provision for gifted pupils is integrated into an appropriate learning environment and an enriched curriculum giving the gifted and talented students opportunity to demonstrate and develop their talents. Opportunity is also provided through extracurricular activities and clubs providing some more in depth explorations of subjects. Special experiences are also provided throughout the year where students are able to extend and challenge themselves.

#### **SERVICE LEARNING - LOVE IN ACTION**

Staff and students from Faith Lutheran College Senior School travelled to Hope Vale aboriginal community, 50 km north of Cooktown. We were welcomed into the Hope Vale community as guests of Pastor David Spanagel and his wife Pam. There were so many great opportunities to learn from local people in this area and we were fortunate to not only be able to serve the community through holiday programs with school children but also to sit and talk with elders to learn more about the aboriginal culture. A special person we met and talked with was Willie Gordon. Willie runs Guurrbi Tours taking people to rock art site where his father and grandfather were born on land near Hope Vale. During our tour Willie explained the use of rock art to tell stories about families, laws, seasonal food sources, survival and spirituality. Students also had the opportunity to share a devotion on the local radio station, join in community events and visit significant aboriginal landmarks.

The opportunity for students from Faith Lutheran College to participate in this tour is part of a broader Service Learning program focused on exposing students to the needs of others, broadening their world view, seeking justice for all and valuing the dignity of all. #### TOURNAMENT OF MINDS

Tournament of Minds is an Australia wide program designed to encourage students to develop their co-operative problem solving skills, and their creative and critical thinking. It is a problem solving program for teams of students across the Primary Grades. Teams are required to solve two demanding, open-ended challenges. Both are presented on Tournament Day.

This year, two teams of seven students from Faith Junior School chose to work together over a five week period, to solve a Maths Engineering Challenge. 'Spooky Action at a Distance', required the students to build a vehicle that rolled and could be steered, to transport a cargo along a specific path to its destination using only 'nearly invisible' rods and lines with appropriate attachments. The teams were required to present a dramatic performance of the solution to their chosen challenge, within a ten minute time frame, in a 3X3 metre square, using only props, costumes or materials from a given list.

On Tournament Day the teams also solved an unseen Spontaneous Challenge. Only the judges were permitted to view this presentation- no spectators, facilitators or parents were allowed.

Team Navy, Andrew Pollard, Nicholas Bray, Harrison Morrisby, Daniel Russell, Ben Craddock and Brooke Dunford, along with Team Gold, Peter Idriss, Stuart Annand, Dominic Duval, Kye Quevauvilliers, Charlee Webber, Damon Camp and Taylah Purdy, took on the challenge and presented great solutions to the problem. They developed excellent team-work skills, cooperated, took risks, were creative and divergent in their thinking. The judges commended the teams on their ability to work together and support each other.
